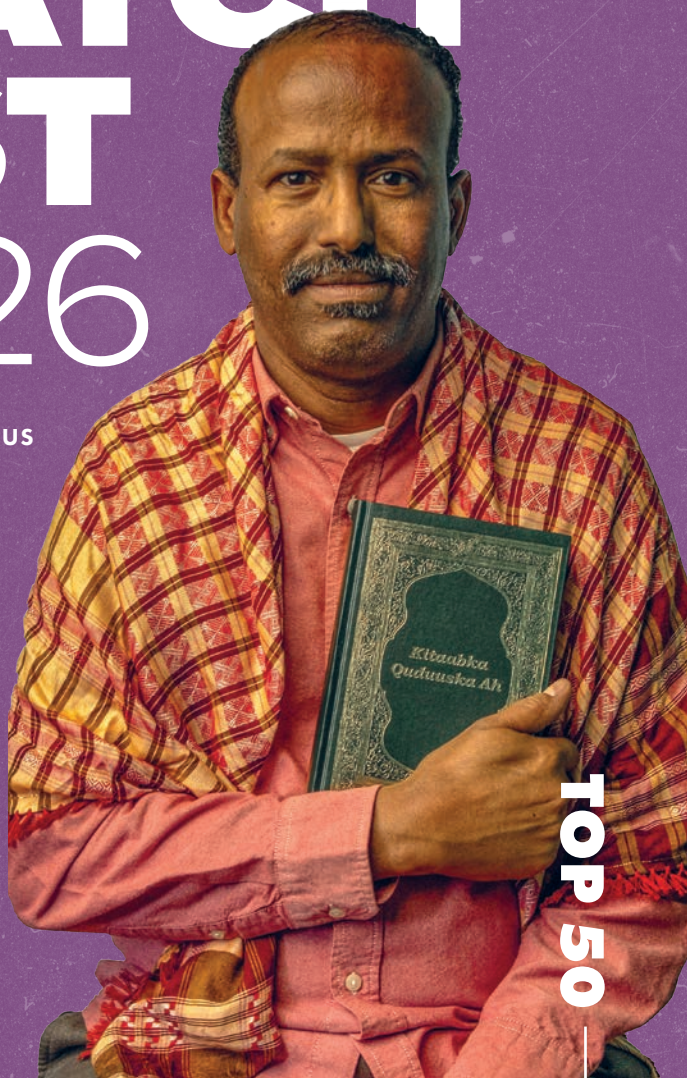

THE ENEMIES OF CHRISTIANITY HAVE ONE AIM: TO MAKE IT IMPOSSIBLE TO BE A CHRISTIAN

To achieve this aim, they pass laws and spread rumours; they close down churches, put pastors in prison and drive Christians out of their homes. They do everything they can to spread fear and hatred, to scorch the earth so badly that the seeds of faith simply cannot grow.

There’s only one problem with this approach. It never works.

Against the odds, in refugee camps and prison cells, in houses and apartments, faith finds a way. Tiny as a mustard seed, silent as yeast, Christianity can grow anywhere.

Silence the sermons, and Christians still talk about Jesus. Close the churches, and Christians still find places to meet. Ban the Bible? They memorise it. Put pastors in prison? They share the gospel between the bars.

This book is a gateway to this world – a world of impossible faith.

Because with man things might be impossible, but with God it’s a different story entirely.

WHAT MAKES PERSECUTION POSSIBLE?

Sometimes we read stories of persecution in places like India and China and think, “How is this even possible? How do they get away with it?”

Persecution happens for many reasons. But there are some key factors which make it possible, even easy, for the enemies of Christianity to attack the church.

WAR AND ANARCHY

Persecution thrives in chaos and anarchy. The breakdown of state authority creates lawless zones where criminals and extremists attack Christians knowing that they will not face any consequences. This is the case in countries like **Yemen (3)**, **Sudan (4)**, **Libya (9)** and **Myanmar (14)**. The most striking example this year is **Syria (6)**, where the fall of the Assad regime has

led to a surge of violence, moving the country up 12 places in the World Watch List. This breakdown of state control also results in countries with a kind of split personality. Where the government

is strongest, Christians live in relative tranquillity; where it is weak, they are persecuted. **Nigeria (7)**, for example, is both home to Africa’s largest Christian population, and also the country where Christians face the most violence. In the south there are mega-churches; in the north thousands have been killed and millions forced to flee their homes and live in camps.

DICTATORSHIPS AND AUTHORITARIANISM

Christians are citizens of the Kingdom of God. Of course, to many political leaders this is an extremely distasteful idea. Their dictatorial regimes equate religious independence with political dissent, and that must always be stamped out. So they attack Christians with all the tools of the state – media censorship, corrupt courts, spies, surveillance and secret police. Nowhere is this more obvious than **North Korea (1)**, where the leader insists on being worshipped like a god and Christians are characterised in state propaganda as traitors and spies. Political authoritarianism has also intensified in **Cuba (24)** and **Nicaragua (32)**. In September 2025, the government in **China (17)** published a list of 18 rules which, among other things, require religious leaders to support the Chinese Communist Party, as well as forbidding fundraising, outreach to youth, or distribution of religious apps and publications.

Islam are seen as betraying their community or family: they can fall victim to localised, community-driven violence, even public execution.

CRIMINALITY AND GREED

Persecution is often driven by very basic impulses, such as greed, corruption and crime. Jesus warned His followers that they would be persecuted because

they were like Him, so any Christ-like life is likely to provoke opposition. In **Mexico (30)**, warring gangs and cartels often target church leaders, especially those who attempt to broker peace or who provide assistance to victims. In **Pakistan (8)**, trumped-up blasphemy charges are used to take Christians’ land or simply settle old scores. Where poverty and crime are rife, where food is scarce and there is competition for land, Christians make easy targets.

THE IMPOSSIBLE FAITH OF THE CHURCH

Perhaps the most potent and powerful reason for persecution is that, in all these countries, the church is still present and alive. In some places, it’s even growing! Despite the best efforts of dictators, extremists, secret policemen and party officials, Christians continue to show remarkable resilience and creativity in how they witness to Jesus. Churches still meet, prayers are prayed, scripture is shared and the gospel is still proclaimed. The enemies of Christianity will always try to make life impossible for Christians. But it won’t work. Because ours is an impossible faith. And nothing is impossible with God.

INTOLERANCE AND EXTREMISM

Perhaps the single biggest factor in enabling persecution is the belief that Christianity is heretical, blasphemous or simply wrong. So religious extremists see the persecution of Christians as a righteous act. Islamist extremism is the most obvious current example of this, especially in theocracies like **Iran (10)** and **Afghanistan (11)** where it is backed by the power of the state or in the many, many countries where jihadist groups kill and abduct Christians in the name of their faith. But Islamist extremism is not the only cause. Whether it’s Hindu extremists in **India (12)**, Buddhist extremists in **Myanmar (14)**, or even Communist zealots in **Cuba (24)** or **Laos (28)** – they all claim their country should be purged of ‘unbelievers’.

NATIONALISM AND HATRED

More and more states or political parties equate religion with national identity. In **India (12)**, nationalist politicians claim that to be Indian is to be Hindu, enabling states to impose anti-conversion laws. In the **Maldives (19)**, it is assumed that all citizens are Muslim. This also filters down to the local level. In **Somalia (2)**, converts from

ABOUT THE WORLD WATCH LIST

Now in its 33rd year, the Open Doors World Watch List ranks the countries where the persecution of Christians is most extreme. Data is based on in-country, eyewitness information, using networks developed over decades. This data is converted into a 'persecution score', which is ranked into categories:

- **EXTREME:** 81-100 points
- **VERY HIGH:** 61-80 points
- **HIGH:** 41-60 points

1 NORTH KOREA

PERSECUTION SCORE 97 (-1) ↓

If you are found to be a Christian in North Korea, you and your family will be immediately executed or sent to a labour camp – for the rest of your life.

The 'anti-reactionary thought law', introduced in 2020, made it even clearer that being a Christian and owning a Bible is a serious crime.

North Koreans may only pay homage to the Kim regime, not God. Christian gatherings must be completely secret; a neighbour could inform on you with devastating results.

Open Doors seeks to strengthen secret believers in North Korea through networks outside the country. This includes emergency relief aid, Christian materials, Christian radio broadcasts, and shelter and training for those who've fled.

PLEASE PRAY

- That God would change the hearts of Kim Jong-un and his family
- For the small, secret gatherings that make up North Korea's courageous church
- That believers will find food, and have opportunity to care for others in need.



How do you tell your children about Jesus, when doing so can bring imprisonment – or even death? That's the impossible challenge facing Christians in North Korea but, astonishingly, secret believers like Young-Mi* find ways.

In a neighbouring country, an Open Doors fieldworker met with Young-Mi, who explained how she shared the gospel with her children. "She couldn't use the term 'God' at all," reports the fieldworker. "But she made it clear that, whenever they're in trouble, they can find help from the One who is in heaven. She said that she hoped her children would have faith in Christ one day, just like she has faith in God."

Young-Mi asked the fieldworker for more teaching about Christianity. "I taught her about living as a child of God. The bottom line was about reading the Bible and prayer.

She was thankful to know that she can pray anytime and anywhere. I could see that she was very focused. Before she left, I prayed for her future steps and her family."

"In such a controlled and dangerous environment, Christian parents face heartbreaking choices," explains Brother Simon*, Open Doors coordinator for North Korean ministry. "Most are too afraid to speak openly about their faith, even to their children. Instead, they focus on instilling Christian values, like kindness and generosity, hoping that one day they'll be able to share the gospel safely."

DID YOU KNOW?

Many North Koreans encounter Jesus through signs and wonders. "If you could see what God is doing in my country, you would never have any doubts again," says a North Korean escapee. "The Holy Spirit is at work, thanks to your prayers."

HOW CAN YOU PRAY?

2 SOMALIA



POPULATION

19.3 million / Hundreds of Christians

LEADER

Prime Minister Hamza Abdi Barre

PERSECUTION SCORE 94 (no change) ↔

Anybody becoming a Christian in Somalia faces danger on all sides: from the authorities, from their clan, and from anti-Christian extremists.

It's illegal for a Muslim to become a Christian. Christians have no legal protection and can be harassed and intimidated by the authorities. Leaving Islam is also seen as seriously dishonouring your family and clan: they may disown, attack or even kill you.

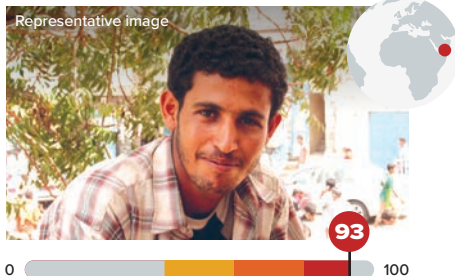
The militant extremist group Al-Shabaab has become more dominant in certain areas. They aim to eradicate Christianity, openly executing suspected believers.

Open Doors supports Somali believers across the Horn of Africa through discipleship training and equipping them to cope with severe persecution.

PLEASE PRAY

- For Christians' protection from Al-Shabaab extremists
- That Somali believers would know they aren't alone, even though they worship in secret
- For healing for the minds and hearts of traumatised Somalis.

3 YEMEN



POPULATION

36 million / A small number of Christians

LEADER

Chairman Rashad al-Alimi

PERSECUTION SCORE 93 (-1) ↓

Yemeni Christians are very vulnerable in the chaos of war and humanitarian crisis.

Most have converted from Islam and must practise their faith in absolute secrecy or risk a death sentence. Those who aren't legally punished are likely to be disowned and persecuted by their family and community.

Last year, Western airstrikes were framed by the Houthis as 'Christian aggression', pushing believers further underground. Most foreign Christians have now fled Yemen. But many Yemeni believers bravely want to stay and serve their people. In fact, the small church is steadily growing.

Open Doors supports persecuted Christians in Yemen by raising prayer, distributing aid, training pastors and believers, giving livelihood support and offering shelter and protection.

PLEASE PRAY

- That peace will finally come to Yemen
- For courage and hope for the Yemenis who risk their lives to follow Jesus
- That secret churches will be able to meet, and leaders find the strength to keep serving.



When Aweis* and a group of believers in Somalia encountered extreme persecution from Islamist militants, they began getting dreams and visions. "We'd emerge stronger," says Aweis of the messages. "God was guiding us. It made us bolder."

Only two of the group were to survive. The rest paid the ultimate price for their faith.

Aweis knew the dangers of following Jesus in Somalia the moment he showed his father a New Testament he'd obtained after becoming curious about Christianity. "I cannot stop you from reading your Bible," his father said. "But if you become a Christian, I'll be the one to kill you."

Aweis later gave his life to Jesus. "I was cut off," he says. "In Somali culture, you're nothing if you're on your own." For seven years, he walked alone in his faith, until he discovered another Christian. Gradually, the group grew. Then persecution struck. One by one, the Christians in the group were killed for their faith. Only Aweis and one other believer survived.

Today, despite huge danger, Aweis lives outside Somalia and serves Somali believers across the Horn of Africa. "When I see how the Holy Spirit is leading this small church, it gives me special joy," he says.

"In Somalia, it seems impossible to become a Christian – the persecution is so intense that, when people count the cost, some may decide not to risk it. Those who take the plunge know they'll lose so much. But with the help of the Holy Spirit, they do it."

DID YOU KNOW?

"There is no open church anywhere in Somalia or the Horn of Africa," explains Zakariya*, who helps support Somali believers. "Where the Somali church is growing, it is invisible."

HOW CAN YOU PRAY?

"Pray that we thrive amidst persecution, that we become more Christ-like," asks Aweis. "So, when persecutors see us, they think, 'Wow, they're so different, we want to be like them.'"

4 SUDAN



POPULATION

50.6 million / 2 million Christians

LEADER

Lieutenant-General Abdul Fattah al-Burhan

PERSECUTION SCORE 92 (+2) ↑

Sudan's civil war has created the world's largest humanitarian crisis. The Christian community is hungry, on the run, and facing strong persecution at the same time.

Sudan's brief period of religious freedom has been rowed back, and oppressive 'morality policies' are back in force. Christians can face physical punishment to convert to Islam, with church leaders arrested. Many church buildings have been closed, bombed or taken over by militia groups.

New Christians face rejection from their families and violence from Islamist extremist groups. In a lawless vacuum, they have no protection.

Open Doors partners in Sudan strengthen Christians through persecution survival programmes, discipleship training and economic empowerment projects.

PLEASE PRAY

- For a peaceful resolution to Sudan's brutal civil war, and a future for the church
- For protection over believers who've fled their homes and those who've stayed
- That Sudanese Christians can show that Jesus' peace is a better way.

5 ERITREA



POPULATION

3.9 million / 1.7 million Christians

LEADER

President Isaias Afwerki

PERSECUTION SCORE 90 (+1) ↑

In Eritrea, following Jesus comes with a constant risk of being thrown into a brutal prison – perhaps forever.

Christians who worship outside the state-sanctioned churches face surveillance, violent police raids and indefinite imprisonment – often in shocking conditions. New converts face rejection by their community as well.

Many Eritreans are forced into military service with no end date. Christians face a devastating dilemma: endure persecution and forced service, or flee the country through routes marked by trafficking, torture and danger.

Open Doors church partners in Eritrea provide persecution survival training and discipleship.

PLEASE PRAY

- For hope and freedom for the many imprisoned Christians
- That God will provide for the daily needs of Christians arrested or detained
- That President Afwerki's heart would be turned away from oppression and toward the love of Jesus.

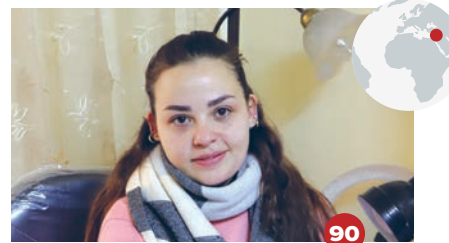

LEADER

President Ahmed al-Sharaa

PERSECUTION SCORE 90 (+12) ↑

Syrian Christians face an uncertain future since the fall of the Assad regime in 2024.

Syria is now mostly controlled by forces led by Hay'at Tahrir al-Sham, an Islamist group with roots in al-Qaeda.

Political instability has led to deadly clashes, with Christians caught in the crossfire. Despite their ancient history, Syrian Christians are often associated with the West, putting them at risk of discrimination and violence. So-called Islamic State's attack on a Damascus church in June 2025 shook the Christian community: at least 22 worshippers were killed and nearly 60 more injured.

Open Doors local partners in Syria help strengthen believers through Bibles and Christian literature, discipleship training, trauma care, relief aid, microloans and other socioeconomic help.

PLEASE PRAY

- For the shocked and frightened survivors of the Damascus church attack
- That Christians living with constant uncertainty will know God is their rock
- That new believers rejected by Muslim families find love and fellowship.

7 NIGERIA

LEADER

President Bola Tinubu

PERSECUTION SCORE 89 (+1) ↑

For several years, Nigeria has been the most violent place in the world for Christians.

Twelve northern states have implemented Sharia (Islamic law), and Christians there live as second-class citizens.

Violent Islamist militant groups – such as Boko Haram and Islamic State West Africa Province – operate across northern and central Nigeria. They abduct women and girls for forced marriage or sexual slavery, beat and kill men, or hold both to ransom.

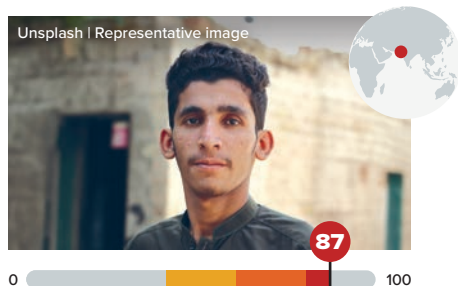
In Nigeria's Middle Belt, militants violently attack Christian farmers. Violence is now spilling into southern states. Thousands of Nigerian Christians were displaced in 2025.

Open Doors partners in Nigeria provide trauma counselling, emergency aid, discipleship training, socio-economic support and persecution survival training.

- That God brings peace to stop the spreading violence in Nigeria
- For hope and stability for the thousands of Christians who have fled their homes
- That Nigeria's government would do everything they can to protect people.

8 PAKISTAN



POPULATION

249.9 million / 4.8 million Christians

LEADER

President Asif Ali Zardari

PERSECUTION SCORE 87 (no change) ↔

Christians in Pakistan experience everything from everyday discrimination to the threat of deadly violence.

Increasingly, Pakistan's blasphemy laws are used to intimidate Christians and other religious minorities. Even an accusation can provoke mob violence against victims that spills into the wider Christian community. Sadly, weak government and the growing influence of Islamist extremist groups leaves Christians with limited protection.

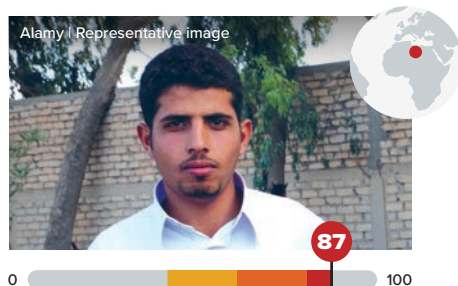
Most Christians descend from the lowest caste in Pakistan and live in poverty, trapped in a cycle of bonded labour on the margins of society.

Open Doors partners in the Gulf region provide education, health and relief work, biblical literacy and leadership training, and livelihood projects.

PLEASE PRAY

- For those unjustly accused of blasphemy to avoid imprisonment or violence
- That Christians forced into menial jobs will know their value in Christ
- That peace will continue between Pakistan and India.

9 LIBYA



POPULATION

7 million / 36,300 Christians

LEADER

Prime Minister Abdul Hamid Dbeibeh

PERSECUTION SCORE 87 (-4) ↓

The absence of a single central government to impose law and order in Libya has left Christians vulnerable to violence.

In recent years, different authorities have increased their monitoring of Christians' online activities. Christian converts from Islam face intense pressure from their families and communities.

Migrant Christians, travelling from other parts of Africa, are targeted by criminal groups. They traffic and kidnap foreign Christians for ransom or force them into hard labour. Each year, many migrant Christians are believed to die trying to reach Europe from Libya.

Open Doors local partners support believers in North Africa through leadership and discipleship training, trauma care, prayer and livelihood help.

PLEASE PRAY

- That the rule of law will return to replace Libya's chaos and violence
- That the few Christians in Libya will find fellowship with each other
- For God's protection over migrant Christians passing through the country.

10 IRAN



POPULATION

90.4 million / 800,000 Christians

LEADER

Ayatollah Ali Khamenei

PERSECUTION SCORE 87 (+1) ↑

In Iran, the secret church is continuing, but it's still illegal to become a Christian. The Islamic regime sees the spread of Christianity as a threat to 'national security'.

Underground churches are raided, followed by arrests, interrogations and long-term incarcerations in dire prisons. The number of church leaders imprisoned skyrocketed last year. Believers are released under strict conditions, such as exile in another part of Iran. Each year, thousands flee Iran to escape persecution.

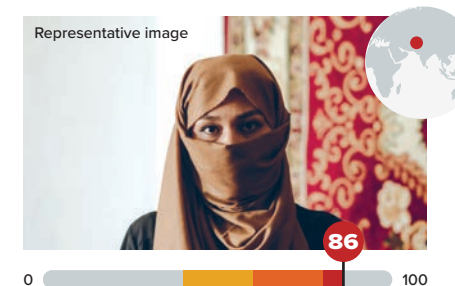
Iran's ancient Armenian and Assyrian Christians must not worship in Persian or discuss faith with Muslims.

Open Doors' partners work in neighbouring countries to help Iranian believers with training, discipleship, trauma care and online ministry.

PLEASE PRAY

- That God will ease the stricter treatment that the authorities apply to Christians
- For the believers who risk everything to gather and worship
- For the comfort and release of church leaders imprisoned in Iran.

11 AFGHANISTAN



POPULATION

44.5 million / Thousands of Christians

LEADER

Taliban Leader Hibatullah Akhundzada

PERSECUTION SCORE 86 (+1) ↑

Afghanistan is a place of extreme persecution for anyone who dares to follow Jesus under the oppressive rule of the Taliban.

As far as the Taliban is concerned, it is not possible that any Afghan could be a Christian. Believers have either fled the country or gone deeper underground. Families and clans feel obliged to deal harshly with those who turn to Christianity. Merely avoiding attending the mosque can trigger suspicions, with catastrophic consequences.

The church exists only in increasingly fragmented, secretive gatherings.

Open Doors raises prayer for Christians and other vulnerable people in Afghanistan.

PLEASE PRAY

- For the Christians still enduring Taliban rule; may God give them a spirit of hope and peace
- For the safety of any Christian refugees sent back to Afghanistan by neighbouring countries
- That God would miraculously change the hearts of the Taliban leaders.

Life is impossibly hard for Christian women in Afghanistan. The Taliban's suffocation of women's rights and religious freedom pushes them into the shadows. Khada* knows this all too well – and yet she can still say, “I’m not just surviving, I’m truly living.”

“My life as a widow in my country is a blend of deep suffering and precious spiritual experiences,” she says. “My husband’s death [for his faith] has left a deep wound in my heart, but faith brings meaning and peace amidst hardship.”

Khada says that whilst Afghanistan is ‘calmer’, it’s no less oppressive. “Yet, I’ve tasted the sweetness of God’s presence. In nights full of tears, He was with me; and in dark days, He lit up hope in my heart. I was not a weak woman, just a broken-hearted one. I press on – stronger, more independent, and with a deeper faith.”

Khada draws encouragement from God moving in people’s lives. “I’ve witnessed sceptics become beacons of faith after experiencing the love and protection of the Holy Spirit. Faith finds its way in, even in the darkest times.”

Crucial to this are your prayers. “Whenever you pray for us, a new flame of hope is kindled in our hearts,” she adds. “In a



world that often forgets us, knowing that someone, somewhere, is praying with a bright heart for us means that we are seen. And to us, that means everything.”

DID YOU KNOW?

Parks, public baths and gyms are off-limits to Afghan women, and they can only enter markets or travel with a male guardian. “It’s a gradual erasure of women from society,” says Khada.

HOW CAN YOU PRAY?

“Please pray for the breaking down of fear and oppression,” asks Khada, “and for patience, comfort and peace for our minds and souls.”

The tensions for Christians in India are on the rise amidst increasing Hindu nationalism and anti-conversion laws in more and more states.

Indian identity is synonymous with Hinduism for much of the population, exacerbating issues of systemic discrimination and attacks on Christians.

Though they are meant to protect all religions, anti-conversion laws have caused the arrest and imprisonment of believers. House churches are sometimes shut down without notice and some states are extending the scope of anti-conversion laws.

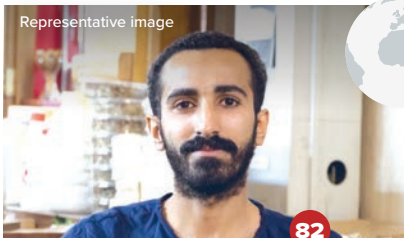

In Saudi Arabia, all citizens are considered Muslim, with Islam a huge part of the national identity.

Leaving Islam technically carries the death sentence, though this has not recently been implemented. Converts who don't keep their faith secret face rejection and even violence from their families and clans. There are no legal public church buildings in Saudi Arabia. Despite all this, the number of Christian converts is growing.

Most Christians in Saudi Arabia are migrant workers. If they are found sharing their faith, they face arrest and deportation.

Open Doors supports the body of Christ on the Arabian Peninsula through organising prayer, biblical resources and training believers and pastors.

PLEASE PRAY

- That God would make a way for Saudi believers to meet together safely
- That migrant Christians who meet in secret can continue to worship without hindrance
- For Jesus to reach more people in Saudi Arabia through dreams and visions.

Christians have been caught in the crossfire, with believers killed, churches bombed and villages destroyed. Thousands have been displaced.

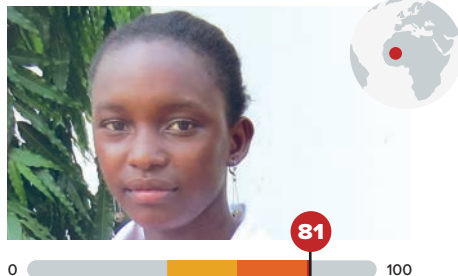
Being Buddhist is seen as part of the national identity. Other faiths are often considered a foreign threat, and converting thus a betrayal. It's very difficult to register a church, and sharing faith is strongly opposed.

Open Doors partners strengthen persecuted believers in Myanmar through literature distribution, persecution survival training and livelihood support.

- For the many thousands displaced by the 2025 earthquake – including Christians – as they rebuild
- For a change of heart in the authorities that stops them targeting Christians

PERSECUTION SCORE 81 (+1) ↑

Some parts of Mali are too dangerous for Christians to live in at all.

In these areas, Islamist extremist groups target Christians with violence, abductions and burning down churches. Evangelical Christians are often accused of being 'Western agents'.

Lawless zones ruled by organised crime leave Christians defenceless against extremists. In 2025, multiple believers were killed and at least 100 churches and Christian properties were destroyed. Under military rule, Christian leaders and activists who dare to speak out face surveillance, intimidation and arbitrary detention.

Open Doors partners support Malian believers through persecution survival training and economic empowerment initiatives.

PLEASE PRAY

- That God makes a way for peace and security to come to Mali
- For protection over Christians at risk from Islamist extremist groups
- For Open Doors partners in Mali as they help displaced believers.

PASTOR YANG



14 MYANMAR

Feeling at home is impossible for Pastor Yang* and his young family in Myanmar. Because of conflict and persecution, displacements are relentless.

"We have had to live amidst the sounds of gunfire and bomb explosions," he says. "All this deeply traumatises my wife. My children fear the loud noises. As a husband and a father, sometimes I feel helpless that I cannot make my own family feel safe."

"WE FEEL UNSAFE HERE, BUT WE CHOOSE TO STAY."

Myanmar is home to the world's longest-running civil war. The military coup in 2021 has heightened hostilities. All Burmese people are vulnerable, but Christians are especially at risk from all levels of society – and from both sides of the conflict.

Incredibly, despite the dangers, Pastor Yang continues to care for the scattered believers under his care. Last year, after yet another period of displacement, a fragile peace allowed the family to return home. "As a pastor, I'm responsible for looking after the remaining believers in the village. We feel unsafe here, but we choose to stay."

Open Doors local partners serve persecuted believers in Myanmar through

various initiatives, including persecution survival training. "The reason we remain resilient amidst persecution and hardship is because of this training," says Pastor Yang.

"My church members are my family members," he explains. "They are my spiritual children. Being a father in the family and a pastor in the church, it is impossible to focus only on my family's difficulties. I cannot ignore them."

DID YOU KNOW?

Christians already faced significant persecution before the coup and the current unrest. Like many conflicts, the situation is used by those in power as an opportunity to target Christians with even tighter restrictions.

HOW CAN YOU PRAY?

"We rely on your prayers for our safety, and I truly believe it's because of those prayers that we're still safe today," says Pastor Yang. Pray for protection, strength and encouragement for all church leaders in Myanmar.

16 BURKINA FASO



POPULATION

LEADER

President Ibrahim Traore

PERSECUTION SCORE 80 (+4) ↑

Burkina Faso rose four spots on this year's World Watch List due to increasing violence towards Christians.

Burkina Faso has been led by a military government since 2022. Political instability has allowed Islamist extremist groups to dominate parts of the country and attack Christians with impunity.

Extremist religious leaders encourage communities to be hostile towards Christians. Churches have been closed and set on fire, and Christian homes and businesses destroyed. Christians can face threats, attacks and displacement. Anyone leaving Islam to follow Jesus is especially at risk.

Open Doors partners serve the church in Burkina Faso through persecution survival training, relief efforts, spiritual care and trauma care.

PLEASE PRAY

- That Islamist extremists would encounter the truth of Jesus
- For comfort for Christians who have been displaced or lost loved ones
- For God's blessing on local partners as they care for displaced believers.

17 CHINA



POPULATION

1.4 billion / 96.7 million Christians

LEADER

President Xi Jinping

PERSECUTION SCORE 79 (-1) ↓

The Chinese Communist Party sees Christianity as a threat that must be tightly controlled and contained.

The state closely monitors who attends its registered churches, and what is preached, to ensure it aligns with Communist ideology. Under-18s are not permitted to attend church.

Many churches therefore decide not to register, and meet as underground house churches. It's a brave move that can bring raids, fines, arrests and imprisonments, especially for church leaders. China also monitors internet use intensely, so believers must be cautious online.

Open Doors partners support persecuted Christians in China through practical support, literature and discipleship training.

PLEASE PRAY

- For protection and courage in the face of the uncertainty
- That God would be working to raise up a new generation of Chinese Christians
- For wisdom and strength for church leaders.

DA WEI

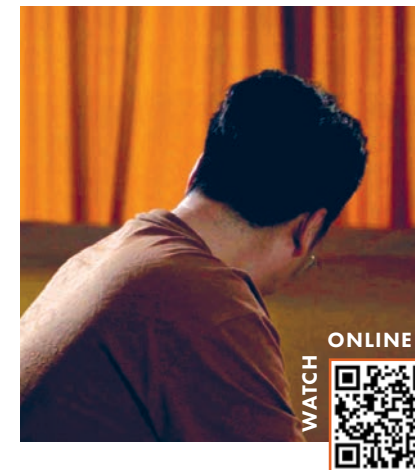
When Da Wei* was first arrested for involvement in a Christian school, he discovered the police had a 23-page profile on him detailing his life as a believer. It was the same for his co-workers. "They even recorded incidents that we almost forgot," he recalls.

Da Wei is passionate about the next generation of believers in China. Voyagers, which he helped found, provides education and discipleship for children, particularly those from challenging backgrounds. But because of suffocating surveillance and laws forbidding under 18s from engaging in religious activities, it's an almost impossible task.

"THANK YOU – YOUR PRAYERS AND SUPPORT ARE LIKE AN ANGEL'S EMBRACE."

After Da Wei and his co-workers were released, the school relocated several times. Once, they bravely took to a local square to evangelise, only to encounter an undercover officer. Students and teachers were detained for six hours, the school was raided, and Da Wei was interrogated a further four times.

Wearied by persecution, Da Wei cried out, "Lord, I want to give up now. It's not that I don't want to continue. We just can't find any places to stay."



His prayer was answered when he happened to meet Open Doors partners, who helped provide a new venue alongside other support. "I deeply feel the importance of companionship and the warmth of fellowship," says Da Wei.

"Thank you – your prayers and support are like an angel's embrace, a beam of light in the darkness, and a charcoal fire in the cold. It's tangible, powerful and heartwarming."

DID YOU KNOW?

People are offered incentives to report on 'illegal' church activities, exposing many Christians to further danger and making it difficult for them to know who to trust.

HOW CAN YOU PRAY?

Da Wei says, "We need more people to participate in, and support, the next-generation ministry for God's Kingdom." Pray for more leaders.

“Stop what you’re doing, or we will kill you,” said the message that greeted Yasin* in Iraq one morning. He’s grown used to the threats, even surviving attempts on his life. And yet, despite the often impossible environment, he keeps sharing the gospel.

Yasin first encountered Jesus through a dream. “I cannot describe how beautiful he was,” he recalls. Initially, he kept his faith from his family, even covering the title of his Bible in tape, but then he shared his secret. “How could you bring such a book into our house?” asked his wife after seeing his Bible. Yet after much prayer, his wife and children also became Christians.

“THERE IS NO OTHER WAY. JESUS DIED ON THE CROSS TO REDEEM ME. I WILL NOT DENY OR LEAVE HIM.”

Sharing the gospel with others, though, has been far more difficult – and dangerous. “My brother tried to kill me several times,” says Yasin. After one threatening letter from someone, his house was firebombed. He’s lost his shop and nobody will give him a steady job. “Sometimes, we are even afraid to go outside,” says Yasin.

Despite the risks, Yasin can’t keep Jesus to himself. And his witness is changing lives. Two people who persecuted him have become Christians, and a further two are exploring faith. Through social media, he’s preached to a Mullah (Islamic leader) and prayed with him. The man is now reading the Bible.

“The persecution is continuous,” says

Yasin. “But there is no other way. Jesus died on the cross to redeem me. I will not deny or leave Him.”

DID YOU KNOW?

The number of Christians in Iraq has depleted to around 187,000 from one million over the last decade due to war and persecution.

HOW CAN YOU PRAY?

“Pray for me, because I believe in the power of prayer,” says Yasin. “Pray that God gives me strength to evangelise to as many people as possible, and that God protects my children.”

The church in Iraq is still working to reestablish itself years after being brutally targeted by so-called Islamic State (IS).

Iraqi Christians – especially converts from Islam – face threats from Islamist extremist groups and discrimination from government agencies. Christians struggle with powerful people seizing their property.

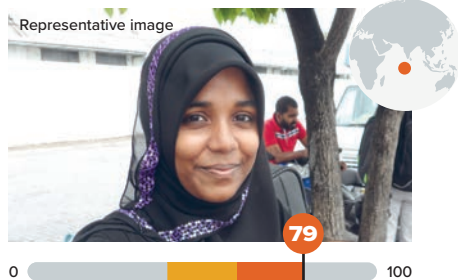
The main pressure on Iraqi Christians comes from Iranian-backed Shiite militias. Turkish and Iranian military operations in Iraqi Kurdistan have also severely damaged Christian villages, causing many believers to flee. In April 2025, an attack was carried out by an IS supporter, injuring two Christians.

Open Doors partners support the church in Iraq through relief aid, Bibles, training and socio-economic development.

- For God's protection over new Christians, and that they'll know they aren't alone
- That believers who have not fled the country are greatly used by God as salt and light in Iraq
- For those affected by the 2025 attack.

The Maldives proudly claims to be '100% Muslim' – and that makes converting to Christianity extremely dangerous.

In this conservative, tight-knit country, where your neighbours know everything, Christian converts must practise their faith in absolute secrecy. It's an isolating existence. Even the internet is censored. Anyone found to be Christian will experience severe opposition from the authorities as well as their family and local community.

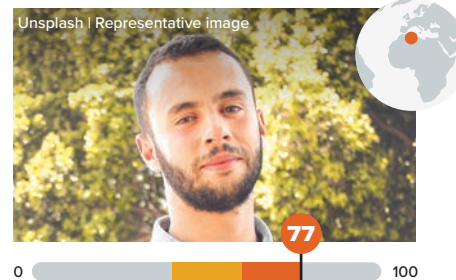
Many foreign Christians work in tourism in the Maldives; they are closely monitored to stop them publicly worshipping or sharing their faith with locals.

Open Doors raises prayer support for our persecuted family in the Maldives.

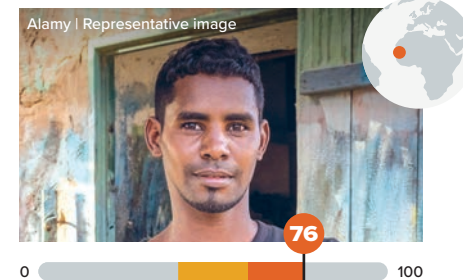
This has isolated Algerian Christians, who are mostly from Muslim backgrounds and face strong opposition from their communities and even their families. Meanwhile, more than 50 Christians have been prosecuted in recent years, with some receiving suspended prison sentences and fines.

Open Doors partners support believers in North Africa through leadership and discipleship training, trauma counselling, prayer and livelihood assistance.

Since 2018, the government has said it will enforce strict apostasy laws, including execution for blasphemy or converting. Christian converts face severe opposition from their families and communities. Extremist leaders have incited public demonstrations against 'infidel' Christians.

Foreign Christians expressing their faith may be viewed as trying to preach to Muslims, which can lead to imprisonment and deportation. It's almost impossible for any Christian in Mauritania to publicly live out their faith.

Open Doors partners support believers in North Africa through leadership and discipleship training, trauma counselling, prayer and livelihood assistance.

PLEASE PRAY

- For followers of Jesus feeling the hostility against them in Mauritania
- That apostasy laws will be overturned and replaced with freedom of religion
- For God's encouragement over Mauritania's small but resilient church.

22 CAR (Central African Republic)

Worsening instability in the Central African Republic (CAR) has contributed to its rise in this year's World Watch List.

Churches have been looted and destroyed, and Christians face threats, detention or assassination. Women and youth suffer exploitation and abuse, with no justice. Thousands of Christians have fled violence and live in overcrowded camps.

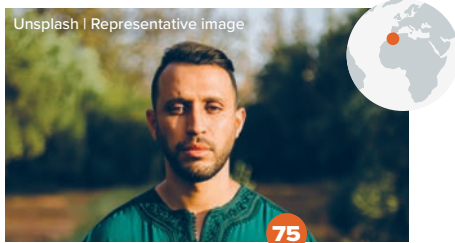
Conflict in neighbouring Sudan now risks spilling into CAR, further endangering vulnerable people – especially Christians.

Open Doors partners support Christians in CAR through persecution survival training, socio-economic opportunities, literacy and discipleship programmes.

Converts can encounter intense pressure to renounce their faith, including isolation, expulsion and violence. They may lose their job. Having a conversation about Christianity is essentially illegal. Understandably, many believers keep their faith secret, and some feel like they're the only believers for miles around.

Open Doors partners support believers in North Africa through leadership and discipleship training, trauma counselling, prayer and livelihood assistance.

PLEASE PRAY

- That Moroccan church leaders will be able to access the leadership training they want and need
- For fellowship for women who convert to Christianity and face severe persecution
- That Christians can be wise and courageous as they live out their faith in Morocco.

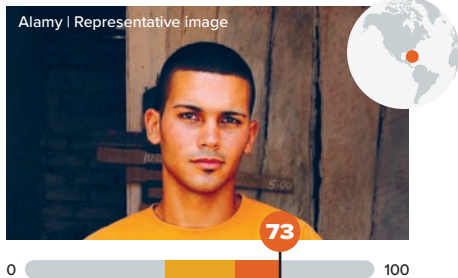

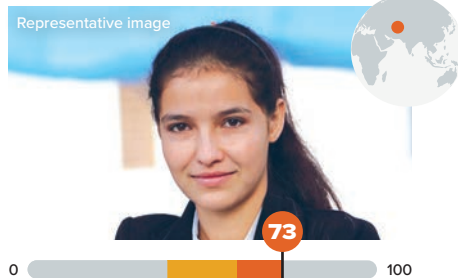

PERSECUTION SCORE 73 (no change) ↔

The authorities in Uzbekistan closely monitor religious activities, making it very challenging for Christians to express and share their faith.

Churches can be hindered by impossible requirements. They are now required to have a minimum number of members, which small congregations can't achieve. In 2025, fines for possessing 'unauthorised' religious literature increased to a crippling figure.

Converts from Islam can face strong opposition from their community. Unsurprisingly, many believers keep their faith secret.

Open Doors strengthens the church in Central Asia through literature distribution, livelihood support, and women and children's ministry.

PLEASE PRAY

- That church leaders would be able to conduct their ministry in peace
- For the believers in non-registered churches at risk of being raided by police
- That new believers from Muslim families will know God's grace and hope.

26 NIGER



POPULATION

29.3 million / 74,900 Christians

LEADER

General Abdourahmane Tiani

PERSECUTION SCORE 72 (no change) ↔

The situation for Christians in Niger has worsened significantly since a coup in 2023.

The instability has helped Islamist extremist groups, including those loyal to so-called Islamic State and al-Qaeda. In some parts of Niger, these groups have imposed strict Islamic law. In other regions, church buildings are destroyed and believers killed.

Any Christians living in places dominated by these Islamist extremist groups will be targeted. Many believers – especially those from Muslim backgrounds – worship in secret, under constant threat of violence, abduction and death.

Open Doors partners in Niger provide economic empowerment, persecution survival training, cross-cultural ministry and discipleship.

PLEASE PRAY

- That the military will govern fairly, offer elections soon, and stability will return
- For protection over Christians displaced from their homes and those at risk from Islamist extremists
- That God will provide for Christian converts who have been shunned.

27 TAJIKISTAN



POPULATION

10.5 million / 55,000 Christians

LEADER

President Emomali Rahmon

PERSECUTION SCORE 72 (+4) ↑

Despite a high number of Muslims living in Tajikistan, the secular state has a tight grip on all religions, including Christianity.

Since 2015, pressure on unauthorised gatherings – such as Protestant churches – has risen, with an increase in raids, interrogations and fines. Under-18s are banned from religious activity, including 'underground' or online religious education.

There are around 3,000 Christian converts from Islam in Tajikistan, all highly vulnerable to additional persecution from their family and community.

Open Doors strengthens the church in Central Asia through literature distribution, livelihood support, and women and children's ministry.

PLEASE PRAY

- For God to keep Christians safe from government monitoring and raids
- For the Afghan refugees – including Christians – that Tajikistan is now deporting to Afghanistan
- For safety for Open Doors partners in Central Asia as they deliver Bibles and training.



LID / LAOS

Once an illiterate believer, Lid* now teaches literacy to persecuted believers, not only giving them vital language skills, but enabling them to read the Bible for themselves.

**POPULATION**

PERSECUTION SCORE 72 (-2) ↓

Christians in Laos face intense persecution from both an authoritarian state and strongly held ethnic traditions.

The authorities view Christianity as a 'Western' religion opposed to Communist ideals. An estimated 75% of Laos' permitted churches lack permanent buildings, and baptisms cannot be held publicly. Consequently, many Christians are forced to meet in 'illegal' house churches.

In rural areas, Christians are seen as threatening traditional religious practices. In many cases, they are deemed to have 'upset' spirits, and persecutors destroy their crops and expel them from the village.

Open Doors partners support the persecuted church in Laos through leadership training, discipleship programmes and literature provision.

PLEASE PRAY

- For God's protection on the underground house churches of Laos
- That Christians expelled from their homes will find shelter and comfort in Jesus
- That the Lao authorities would soften and allow people freedom to follow Jesus.

When Pastor Somchai* and his wife were interrogated in 2003, their refusal to deny Jesus came at a lasting, debilitating cost – their family book was confiscated.

In Laos, the family book is an absolutely vital document. It not only proves your citizenship, it also enables access to public services. "It's more important than a passport or national ID," explains the pastor. "But I was assured that my citizenship is in heaven, not on earth. My hope is in Jesus."

His strong faith was to be rewarded. Many years later, he was returning from visiting a believer when he felt nudged by the Holy Spirit to ask for the impossible. "I was convicted to pray for the return of my family book. For years, I'd been praying that the authorities would return it, but they didn't. But that afternoon was different."

PASTOR SOMCHAI

28 LAOS

Pastor Somchai contacted the authorities and, without obstacle, the book was returned. "The head officer even said, 'We always watch you, but you've never done wrong. You never looked down on others or other religions. You're good and honest.' After over 20 years of prayer, my family book was returned.

"I WAS ASSURED THAT MY CITIZENSHIP IS IN HEAVEN, NOT ON EARTH. MY HOPE IS IN JESUS."

"Prayer needs patience. God answers in His time," he says. "If I'd given up on praying, I wouldn't know the reward that awaits me – the joy of seeking Jesus as I pray."

Today, despite hostility, treacherous roads and extreme weather, the pastor helps

oversee 50 house churches in his region. "Whether far or close, I must go," he says. "This is my calling."

DID YOU KNOW?

Lao authorities regard Christianity as a Western religion, and consider it a threat to Communism. Laos' dependence on China has only reinforced this, adding to the vulnerability of believers.

HOW CAN YOU PRAY?

Ask the Holy Spirit to strengthen church leaders in Laos, like Pastor Somchai, and ask God to meet their every physical, emotional and spiritual need.

29 DRC (Democratic Republic of Congo)



POPULATION

President Félix Tshisekedi

PERSECUTION SCORE 72 (+2) ↑

In eastern DRC, Christians face severe violence. The Allied Democratic Forces – Islamist extremists – have targeted Christian communities with attacks.

DRC rises by six spots on this year's World Watch List, partly due to the resurgence of the M23 rebel group.

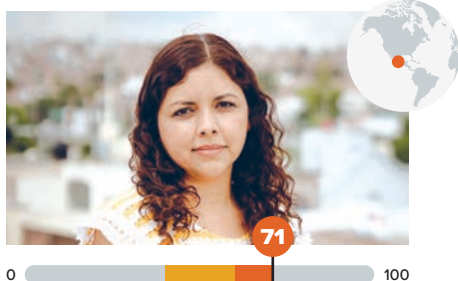
Speaking out against violence or corruption puts Christian leaders at great risk. The authorities threaten, monitor and publicly vilify clergy who criticise them, while taking a stand against M23 can result in abduction.

Open Doors partners in DRC provide physical and spiritual support to persecuted Christians through emergency aid, persecution survival training and discipleship.

- For peace and stability to overcome the violence in DRC
- For courage and hope for believers threatened by attack or displacement
- That DRC's Islamist extremists would encounter Jesus and promote peace instead of hate.

30 MEXICO

PERSECUTION SCORE 71 (no change) ↔

The pervasive presence of criminal groups in Mexico puts many Christians in danger. In many places, law and order has broken down and cartels operate with almost no consequences.

It's often Christians who bravely speak out or try to counter what the criminals are doing, and this puts them at great risk of revenge.

In indigenous communities, those who turn from local beliefs to follow Jesus are exposed to fines, discrimination, imprisonment and displacement, with little hope of justice.

Open Doors strengthens Christians in Mexico through projects including livelihood support, trauma care and legal advocacy.

PLEASE PRAY

- For the brave Christians sharing Jesus in areas where this brings persecution
- That God thwarts the plans of the cartels who bring violence and crime to communities
- For Open Doors local partners as they walk alongside Mexican believers.



ARISE **AFRICA**

THE YEAR THE WORLD STARTED TAKING NOTICE

Millions of Christians in sub-Saharan Africa face violent persecution for their faith. They are attacked and killed. Their houses and churches are burned, their farms stolen. That's why the African church are calling on their global church family to stand with them through the *Arise Africa* campaign.

Last year, the campaign highlighted a powerful message from Pastor Barnabas, a Nigerian church leader. "Millions of Christians are displaced in Nigeria and the whole of Africa," he said. "News doesn't cover it. Nobody talks about it. We are remaining in the darkness."

But by the end of 2025, the darkness had begun to lift. A little.

International media and politicians finally began to report on the situation. There were stories and articles, social media

posts and features on the news. People started talking.

All of which is encouraging. But, of course, talk is easy: what we really need is action. What we really need is change.

'I STILL HAVE GOD'

Abraham is the chairman of an internally displaced people (IDP) camp in Benue State, central Nigeria. He has lived there, with his wife and three children, ever since armed Fulani militants attacked his home village in April 2021. Eight people were killed that night, including Abraham's brother. Entire families fled, their homes and farms left in ashes. Abraham only

escaped by falling into a ditch where he was concealed by leaves.

Life is a daily struggle. "I keep praying to God for provision," Abraham says. "Let Him give us food to eat to encourage us to remain alive, because life is tough here."

Despite the hardship, Abraham is a voice of faith. "I still have God and He is still on the throne," he says. "He will surely deliver me."

Thanks to your support, Open Doors partners were able to deliver much-needed food supplies. The impact this has made on Abraham and so many others, both practically and spiritually, is enormous.

"The food being given to us shows us that Christians all over the world care about us and remember us," Abraham says. "This organisation is helping thousands of people in Nigeria, not just me."

ATTACKS IN BENUE

Five years on, things have not improved in the region. Benue State has seen many more attacks. On one night alone, in June 2025, a Christian

farming community in Benue State was attacked by Fulani militants. They shot or burned to death more than 200 people, mostly women and children.

Meanwhile, the response of our supporters around the world has been remarkable. Open Doors' emergency appeal for Christians in Benue was able to help thousands of victims. And thanks to your support the *Arise Africa* petition has globally amassed hundreds of thousands of signatures.

But there is a long way to go. Millions of Christians in sub-Saharan Africa have been displaced by violence and conflict. Their voices need to be heard.

As Abraham says, "Brothers and sisters, I appeal to you all that you help us by praying for us and these attacks. We are appealing to Christians all over the world to look upon our sufferings and come to our rescue."

The *Arise Africa* campaign is neither stopping, nor slowing down. We are continuing to ask supporters to speak up and to call on the UK government and international community to act.

ARISE AFRICA - THE COUNTRIES

Throughout the region, persecution feeds on lawlessness and failing governmental control. Of the 14 sub-Saharan countries in the top 50, five have seen the overthrow of their governments, two have suspended their constitutions, and five are in the grip of armed conflict.

15 MALI

The level of violence has risen so much that Open Doors' researchers now define the level of persecution in the country as 'extreme'.

16 BURKINA FASO

At least 150 Christians were killed and more than 100 churches or public Christian properties were destroyed or closed due to militant Islamist activities.

26 NIGER

Extremist groups perpetrate killings, abductions, village raids and extortion. Huge rural areas are effectively controlled by armed groups or criminal networks.

48 CHAD

Conflict has spilled over from neighbouring countries, especially Sudan.

29 DRC

Islamist extremists target Christian communities in the east. Churches are easy targets. Christians wearing crosses risk being killed on sight.

7 NIGERIA

This is the most violent place on earth for Christians. Last year, 3,490 Christians were killed because of their faith – an increase of 12.5% from the previous year.

31 TUNISIA

Christians in Tunisia are subject to increasing surveillance by Tunisian authorities. They may be arrested, questioned and have their homes searched.

For the first time last year, authorities arrested foreign Christians under the guise of tackling human trafficking. Many of these Christians were not undocumented migrants, but foreign-born Christians who lost their jobs, faced racial abuse from their communities, or felt forced to flee.

Due to hostility, Tunisian Christian converts feel forced to conceal their faith. Unable to gather for worship and mutual support, they feel very isolated.

Open Doors partners support the church in North Africa through leadership, discipleship and ministry training, and supporting Christians' livelihoods.

PLEASE PRAY

- That God would bring freedom of religion to Tunisia
- For God's protection over converts from Islam who face substantial persecution
- That followers of Jesus would find fellowship and grow in discipleship.

32 NICARAGUA

PERSECUTION SCORE 71 (no change) ↔

Christians in Nicaragua are increasingly being silenced under dictatorial rule.

Believers who speak up about human rights violations have faced surveillance, intimidation, imprisonment and even losing their citizenship. Meanwhile, churches and other Christian institutions have had assets seized, activities disrupted and buildings vandalised.

This growing suffocation of Christian freedom began after nationwide protests against the government in 2018. It's only got worse, with legal changes enabling a crackdown on the church.

Open Doors strengthens the church in Nicaragua through livelihood support, legal assistance, persecution survival training and leadership care.

PLEASE PRAY

- For pastors in Nicaragua who face arbitrary arrest and detention
- For God's protection on Open Doors partners as they seek to strengthen the Nicaraguan church
- That churches under surveillance would have courage and wisdom.

Tribal Christians from ethnic minorities are particularly vulnerable to persecution. Converts among the Rohingya refugees from Myanmar face huge pressures from their community, including death threats.

Open Doors partners strengthen the persecuted church in Bangladesh through emergency aid, Bibles and other literature, and discipleship training.

- For healing and endurance for Christian communities attacked by extremists
- For people who change faiths to follow Jesus – may they know they aren't alone

Outside of the capital city, it's very difficult for Christians to express their faith. The close-knit society makes it hard to follow Jesus quietly, and neighbours may report you to the authorities. Bhutan village leaders issue a certificate to confirm you are a good citizen; without this, Christians may be unable to get a loan or a job.

Sharing the gospel can lead to up to three years in prison. Christians have to gather in secret.

Open Doors partners strengthen the persecuted church in Bhutan through prayer and practical emergency support.

PLEASE PRAY

- For protection over Christians in Bhutan whose only option is attending 'illegal', unregistered churches
- For believers who have converted from Buddhism and face great opposition
- For hope and joy for Open Doors partners supporting the church in Bhutan.

All religious material must be checked and authorised by the state, and there's a ban on Christian religious education of children, even privately. Registering new churches is virtually impossible, and even the historic churches of Turkmenistan can find their services monitored.

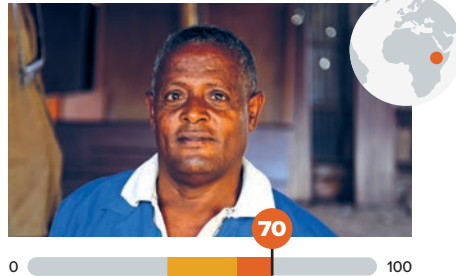
Meanwhile, those who leave Islam to follow Jesus can also face huge opposition from their own families and communities.

Living as a Christian in Ethiopia brings opposition from many sources, and the pressure believers face is increasing.

For those who have converted from Islam, the threats are severe. Churches in Muslim-majority areas may be burnt down, believers attacked by mobs and businesses discriminated against.

Those who do not conform to the Ethiopian Orthodox Church are often portrayed as foreign and unpatriotic. They often face pressure from their own family to return to the Orthodox Church.

Open Doors partners work in Ethiopia to provide psychosocial care, spiritual resilience training, intergenerational ministry skills training and economic empowerment projects.

PLEASE PRAY

- That believers would be united in the face of opposition
- For protection of Christians who live in areas where extremist militants are active
- For God's blessing on trauma care work carried out by Open Doors partners in Ethiopia.

BULBULA AND ADAM

Bulbula* and Adam* are inseparable. They chat about everything and go to church together. It's a beautiful friendship – one impossible to imagine a few years ago when Adam tried to kill Bulbula.

Bulbula, a former Muslim leader, met Jesus through dreams. "Come, I want you," said Jesus. One day, he was walking in town when a man said, "Come, God wants you." He took Bulbula by the hand, brought him to church, before mysteriously disappearing.

"HE WAS MY PERSECUTOR AND NOW HE'S MY FRIEND."

Bulbula became a Christian, but it's brought severe persecution from even his own family – and that included Adam, his cousin. "I thought of you as a disgrace and an infidel – that's why I tried to kill you with a spear," says Adam.

Everything changed when Adam had an encounter of his own with Jesus in his small hut. "He stood there like a real person, and said, 'My son, I am calling you,'" he remembers. Like Bulbula, Adam's decision to follow Jesus has been met with hostility.

He's lost possessions and crops, his wife has divorced him, and he's been beaten.

Now united by faith in Jesus, Bulbula and Adam support each other. "He was my persecutor and now he's my friend," says Bulbula. "Persecution is good for us. It is best for us to continue walking in the right path, learning from the Bible. We stand strong saying, 'We know the right path. We've found peace and we stick to it.'"

DID YOU KNOW?

Despite Ethiopia dropping three places to 36th in the World Watch List, the situation has not improved. In 2025, some 25 churches were attacked in a wave of violence by armed groups.

HOW CAN YOU PRAY?

That Bulbula and Adam will remain steadfast in faith and that their stories of God's love and power will lead many others to Jesus.

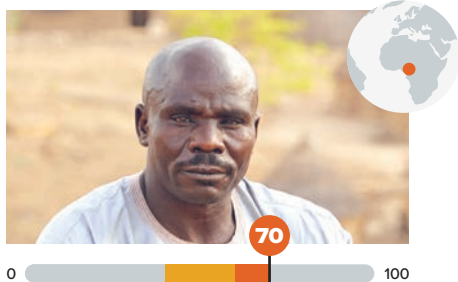
PASTOR HAMZA / CAMEROON

Pastor Hamza's church was burned to the ground by extremists. "They came, they attacked, they killed," he says. "They burned the churches. Seven people died." Now he must find a way to encourage his flock in the face of violence and fear. "The faith of many has weakened. Pray that they will persevere and that we will have the strength to bear the suffering."

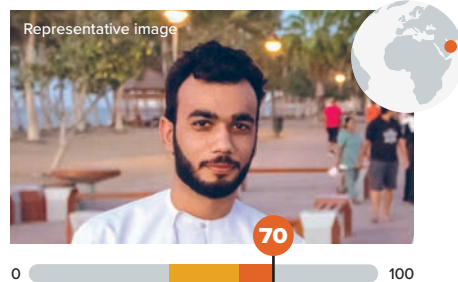
Vulnerability also stems from clan violence and organised crime where protection from authorities is scarce. Anyone who speaks out against the perpetrators runs the risk of intimidation or even arrest, and churches can be closed.

Christians born on Omani soil who converted from Islam are often strongly opposed by family, community and government. The consequences can touch every part of life, such as employment or even custody of children.

Whilst foreigners enjoy more freedoms than native Omanis, they must not share their faith. If they are caught sharing the gospel with Muslims, they are likely to be deported.

Open Doors supports the body of Christ on the Arabian Peninsula through organising prayer, distributing biblical resources and training believers and pastors.

- That God would lead converts from Islam safely to Christian community
- For the continued spread of the gospel and bold witness despite opposition
- That foreign believers would be salt and light in their communities.

From one day to the next, believers in Mozambique can face myriad threats on their lives and homes.

Where extremist militant groups are active, churches may be burnt down and individuals executed for their faith. Such threats especially arise from northern regions such as Cabo Delgado Province, where Christians are targeted.

Many choose to keep their faith secret, especially if they have converted from Islam. Even where violence is not as present, as in southern regions, Christians can still face repercussions for speaking out against the authorities.

Open Doors supports the church in Mozambique through cross-cultural ministry training and persecution survival training.

- For the victims of attacks, that they would know healing and the Lord's protection
- That stability would return to Mozambique
- For displaced believers and their constant knowledge of God's presence with them.

PERSECUTION SCORE 68 (+2) ↑

For Christians in Kyrgyzstan, intense opposition can come from your own family and neighbours.

Leaving Islam means facing great hostility which can affect followers of Jesus at every age and stage – children can be bullied at school, whilst community members can be preached against by imams [Muslim leaders] and expelled from the neighbourhood.

New laws introduced early in 2025 have tightened the authorities' control on church activity. This means that registering a church is almost impossible and Protestant groups are labelled as 'extremist'.

Open Doors strengthens the church in Central Asia through literature distribution, livelihood support, women and children's ministry, and prayer support.

PLEASE PRAY

- For wisdom for believers as they navigate new religious laws introduced in 2025
- That God would protect and sustain converts from Islam facing opposition
- For the Lord's shielding of house churches under threat from infiltration.

For believers, faith must be carried out in secret, behind closed doors. Threats of violence and social rejection confront those who convert from Islam and choose to follow Jesus.

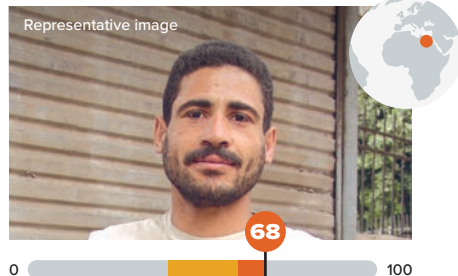
Government control of expression and activities is on the rise, increasingly limiting the practices of the church

For believers in Egypt, persecution often comes from those closest to them. Many are ostracised by their community or even expelled for alleged blasphemy.

Rural areas are the hardest places to live for Christians in Upper Egypt. Women can be aggressively harassed, and others are made victims of mob attacks.

Even though the president speaks warmly of the nation's Christian heritage, construction of churches remains limited, and believers are vulnerable to violence

Open Doors partners support the church in Egypt through discipleship, leadership development, literacy training, medical outreach, and widows' ministry.

PLEASE PRAY

- That believers who are looked down on would know their value in the Lord
- For God to protect Egyptian Christians against attacks
- That God would work through Open Doors partners to counter harmful cultural norms.

SAMIR

42 EGYPT

At first, the grief was impossible for Samir to navigate. On 15 February 2015, in a tragedy witnessed by the world, his son was amongst 21 believers martyred in Libya. But over the years, faith has illuminated a path that's even enabled Samir to do what was once unthinkable – forgive his son's killers.

Girgis was 24 when he, alongside 20 other Egyptians and one Ghanaian, were kidnapped by so-called Islamic State. After refusing to deny Jesus, they were taken to a beach and, clothed in orange and facing their captors dressed in dark black, they were beheaded. As footage of their deaths spread worldwide, the 21 martyrs became a testament to unwavering faith.

“I PRAY FOR THOSE WHO KILLED HIM – THAT THEY MAY SEE THE TRUTH AND FOLLOW THE LIGHT. I HAVE FORGIVEN THEM.”

Like the other martyrs, Girgis had gone to Libya to seek better opportunities to support his family. “He'd been engaged and was planning to marry in August of that same year, when he planned to return home to Egypt for good,” says Samir.

“My son is a martyr for Jesus, and that is a blessing. I pray for those who killed him – that they may see the truth and follow the light. I have forgiven them.



They did not know what they were doing. Why shouldn't I forgive? The Lord forgives us every second, and He forgave His own persecutors.

“Girgis is with Jesus, and that is what matters now,” Samir adds. “I surely miss him every second.”

DID YOU KNOW?

Matthew, the Ghanaian among the 21 martyrs, became a Christian after seeing the courageous faith of the Egyptians as they faced death. Ghana refused to receive his body, so Egypt embraced him as one of their own.

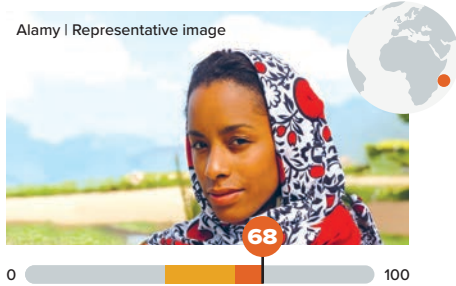
HOW CAN YOU PRAY?

In Comoros, Christians must be silent when it comes to discussing their faith.

In a country where Sunni Islam dominates culture and is used to suppress freedom of religion, the least mention of Jesus could be interpreted as proselytising – a punishable offence.

This kind of pressure on Christians spreads out across the nation because of its small size. Converts from Islam are most at risk of threats and social ostracism. Women could easily be subjected to trafficking, as Comoros serves as a transit hub for exploitation beyond its shores.

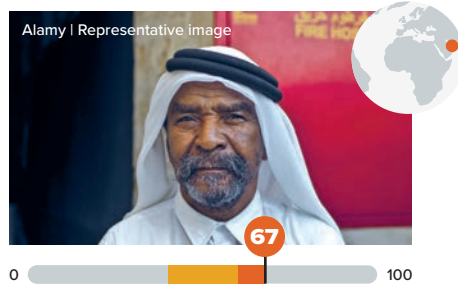
Open Doors partners support Christians throughout East Africa with discipleship programmes and economic empowerment initiatives.

Changing religion from Islam is not officially recognised by the authorities, causing serious legal issues around property and status.

Church leaders must take extra caution in their activities, as evangelising amongst Muslims is strictly forbidden.

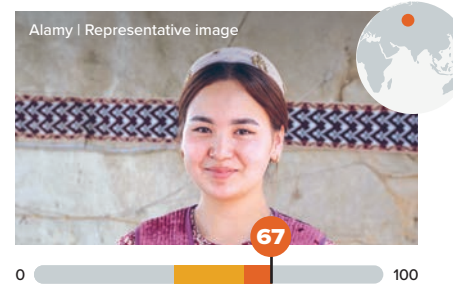
Open Doors supports the body of Christ on the Arabian Peninsula through raising prayer, distributing Scripture resources, discipleship and training believers and pastors.

Raids, arrests and fines form an expected part of life for many from Protestant denominations, whilst Russian Orthodox churches encounter fewer problems because of their relative lack of engagement with surrounding communities.

To convert from Islam to Christianity is perceived as an assault on Kazakh identity, making attending church or talking about faith even harder for believers of a Muslim background.

Open Doors strengthens the persecuted church in Central Asia through literature distribution, livelihood support, women and children's ministry and prayer support.

PLEASE PRAY

- That believers would continue to have access to God's Word and be fed by it
- For the Lord's refreshment of church leaders amidst the restrictions they face
- That God would comfort converts who have been alienated from their families.

Christians in Nepal face daily pressure from their Hindu neighbours, hemmed in by the widespread belief that the nation should return to being an officially Hindu country.

Anti-conversion laws and pressure from family combine to create an atmosphere of fear for believers in an already uncertain political landscape. Such instability provides a cover for violence against Christians which has contributed to the rise in Nepal's World Watch List ranking.

Open Doors local partners in Nepal distribute Bibles and Christian literature, provide holistic and biblical training, give socio-economic aid and provide emergency help for believers in need.

PLEASE PRAY

- For the protection of Christians who have converted from Hinduism
- That God would turn the hearts of Hindu extremists towards Him
- For political stability and freedom of religion to become a priority of the Nepalese government.

PASTOR ROMAN

CENTRAL ASIA

“Lord, this is the last prayer of my life,” said Pastor Roman* aloud after digging his own grave and surrounded by an armed group. “Give me your wisdom.”

The pastor led a house church in Central Asia. But the property where they met was wanted by the 30-strong group for their fight with another tribe. The believers were threatened with death unless they relinquished it within a few days.

With astonishing bravery, the house group decided to stay – and pray. They were convinced God had given them the house for them to bless their community.

When the armed men returned a few days later, only to be met with resistance, they summoned the believers from the home. “We’re not going to kill you all yet,” they

said. “We are going to kill your pastor first.” Pastor Roman was taken to a rubbish dump, where he uttered what he believed was his last prayer.

“I pray for my persecutors, Lord,” he continued. “Please give them what they need, and bless their families.”

“Why are you praying for us?” said an attacker.

“I forgive you for shooting me,” the pastor replied. “God loves you very much. His love will remain with you, no matter what.”

“I FORGIVE YOU FOR SHOOTING ME.”

Astonished, the group said, “You’re crazy. Go to your group and we’ll come and get

you again.” Such was his readiness to die for Jesus and be with Him in heaven, Pastor Roman was upset that he was still alive, but his house church was delighted – they were so happy to see him!

“I PRAY FOR MY PERSECUTORS, LORD.”

A week later, the armed men returned. “We’ve come to tell you something,” its leader told Pastor Roman. “A few days ago, we were on our way to a commando mission when we were ambushed. We were shot at from all sides and had no way to flee. We thought our last hour had come. But what happened was very miraculous, because none of us were hit by a bullet. None of us were even injured. Your prayer came to mind. Your prayer had made a big impression on us anyway, and you even

prayed for our protection. That prayer has been answered. Thank you, and know that you can continue to live and gather in freedom. We’ll protect you.

DID YOU KNOW?

In some parts of Central Asia, Christians are labelled ‘deviant’ or ‘extremist’, giving the authorities an excuse to target them with close surveillance and tight restrictions.

HOW CAN YOU PRAY?

Pastor Roman epitomises the bravery of church leaders in Central Asia, but it’s costly. Ask the Holy Spirit to nourish them as they pour themselves out for the gospel.

President Gustavo Petro

PERSECUTION SCORE 66 (no change) ↔

Crime, drugs, gang life – this is the context in which Christians follow Christ in Colombia.

Escalating violence means that the activities of Christians, and especially those of church leaders, are under constant threat from gang violence. Church leaders work to rehabilitate ex-gang members and prevent young people from being recruited, and this makes them a target of the cartels.

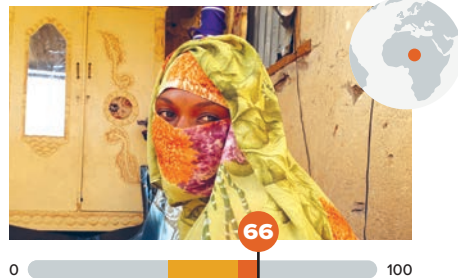
Believers from indigenous communities can run the risk of imprisonment and discrimination: those who oppose them claim that they have betrayed local traditions.

Open Doors supports persecuted Christians in Colombia through trauma care, legal advice, education support, emergency aid and biblical training.

Believers in Chad face threats every day – from their communities, extremist groups and the government.

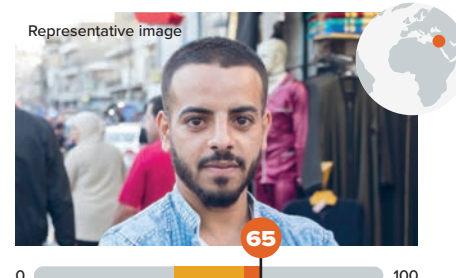
Surveillance and harassment form an atmosphere of tension and insecurity for Christians seeking to carry out church activities or share their faith with others. Dread of the next attack by Islamist extremist groups contributes to the pressure upon them. Some areas have less state protection than others, making Christians in these areas more vulnerable to attack.

Open Doors local partners in Chad offer persecution survival training, economic empowerment programmes and other support to help persecuted Christians remain resilient.

PLEASE PRAY

- That God would change the hearts of extremists who carry out violence against Christians
- For the hope and peace of believers under pressure from their families
- That God would help the church in Chad stand firm and show the light of Christ.

49 JORDAN



POPULATION

11.4 million / 170,000 Christians

LEADER

King Abdullah II

PERSECUTION SCORE 65 (no change) ↔

Believers in Jordan who belong to Orthodox or Roman Catholic churches benefit from a relatively high level of freedom, but pressures continue to restrict their worship.

Despite the general culture of tolerance for different faiths, extremist groups pose an unmistakable threat to Christians through violence, including murder. At work, Christians can find themselves discriminated against for their faith and placed under government monitoring.

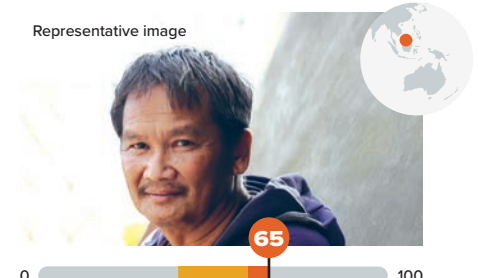
Those who preach encounter multiple restrictions, whilst converts from Islam face discrimination and obstacles when it comes to legal status or marriage.

Open Doors local partners support the church in Jordan through training, relief, rehabilitation, research and prayer.

- That the monarchy would continue to recognise the positive presence of the church in Jordan
- For those who have lost family, friends and community because they follow Jesus
- That the Lord would embolden the witness of Jordanian Christians.

50 BRUNEI



POPULATION

459,000 / 53,000 Christians

LEADER

Sultan Sire Hassanal Bolkiah

PERSECUTION SCORE 65 (-1) ↓

The pressure on Christians in Brunei is increasing with the continuing implementation of Sharia (Islamic law).

The consequences for leaving Islam create an atmosphere of fear for believers, pushing them into silence on their faith. Apostasy is punishable by law and Christians could be imprisoned for up to 30 years.

These pressures cover every age group. Islamic education is obligatory for students, making it harder for parents to teach their children about Jesus. Church life is more and more marginalised and some evangelistic activities even criminalised.

Open Doors raises prayer support for persecuted believers and for the authorities in Brunei.

PLEASE PRAY

- That there would be increasing freedom to choose and practise one's faith in Brunei
- For God to sustain young believers who are subjected to an Islamic education
- That the Lord would enable more churches to register freely and gain legal status.

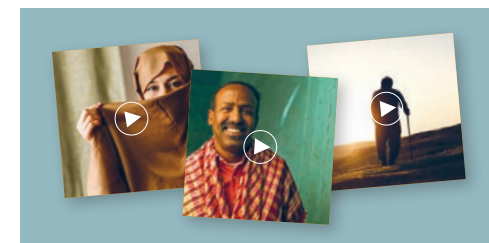
